The Compiled Inscription and Burial Records

The Religious Society of Friends, commonly called Quakers in the 17th Century, had established a Preparative Meeting in Morris County and built the Meeting House in 1758 on land purchased from Robert Schooley. The Meeting had met in homes from 1740 and had reported members, births, marriages, deaths and removal transfers to other meetings in business records kept at the Monthly Meeting, initially the Woodbridge Monthly Meeting, then Rahway-Plainfield Monthly Meeting. After the Preparative Meeting was laid down, or discontinued after 1865, permission for use of the Meeting House and this burial ground / cemetery by Friends and descendants created an institution, called the Friends Meeting House and Cemetery Association of Randolph Township, which has continued.

The Friends believed in plain dress, living and death without adornment. Initially

situated in the northern portion of Mendham Township, it was known as Mendham Friends Meeting. The County of Morris was formed in 1739 from Hunterdon County, and its area included the present Morris, Sussex and Warren Counties. In 1753, the area comprising the current Sussex and Warren counties was established as Sussex County, and the area was divided in the 19th Century into the present Sussex County and Warren County. A meeting called Hardwick Friends Meeting was formed in 1750's, with a meeting house and cemetery along Shades of Death Lane near Allamuchy in the current Warren County. Unadorned cemeteries near each plain meeting house endured. The current burial grounds both have recorded and inscribed graves, and there are unrecorded burials.

Searching Ancestry.com on the internet found papers on Quaker mortuary practices by Dan Treadway sharing views in 1998 by Mary Ellen Chijioke of the Friends Historical Library at Swarthmore College, by Nigel Pocock on friends burial practices in The Quakers in East Tytherton, and a discussion on the <http://funeralwise.com/customs/quaker> page entitled "Quaker Funeral Customs."

This writer, when visiting England with his wife, and having the oldest Christian

church with a cemetery explained as having memorial stones dating from the 19th Century as a result of recycled space every three hundred years.

The need of Friends to commemorate the dead drew comment as early as 1717, and again in 1765, concerning markers and memorials over the remains of the dead (Pocock). The primary way to remember a deceased person was at a funeral "service," mostly unchanged over 350 years, where silence at a called meeting is broken by persons moved by the spirit to describe the person's life, a celebration more than mourning, through minutes on the ministry served, which the Quarterly Meeting or Yearly Meeting could have read (or published also). Burials at the Arch Street Meeting ceased when the meeting house was built in 1804. Burials had been four layers deep in rows as space became available (Chijioke), but space in the same grave was allotted for a spouse. A service would not follow a ritual, may involve a printed explanation of what will happen or may be expected (by those non-Quaker attendees), and some may read a prayer or poem, as the funeral takes 60 to 90 minutes. The emphasis upon honoring a person's life and experiencing God's presence at the meeting for burial was paramount.

Quaker records establish within families the birth right membership of individuals, removal of a family or individual to another meeting, marriage within Friends, and death.

The Friends Cemetery where the dead are laid to rest ought to record the deaths of Quakers from the Meeting, including those before memorials have been so readily erected (noted by Friends Cemeteries at Plainfield, [Mendham] Randolph, Hardwick from New Jersey and others near Coatesville, Chester County, Pennsylvania] after 1840. When next one visits at Longwood Gardens near Kennett Square, where Quaker brothers created an arboretum, a visitor center had been a Meeting House of Progressive Friends, and a Friends cemetery with memorials has been maintained.

Mr. Tom Moore had noted to this writer how his ancestors had been interred at the Randolph Friends Cemetery without any memorials surviving, which was mentioned for a family [Hill] at the Orchard Street Cemetery in Dover and a family [Yates] at Evergreen Cemetery in Morristown. George Washington Yates as a fugitive slave, had escaped from Tennessee on the Underground Railroad, as reported by a descendant, The Reverend Eugene Hill, stopped briefly at the Randolph Friends Meeting House, and served in a New

Jersey [volunteer] militia regiment at Bull Run in 1861. The late Kemper Chambers noted that Yates had no memorial, save the metal star of the Grand Army of the Republic in storage at Evergreen Cemetery in Morristown. Mr. Chambers had used record cards used by Irving Skolnick, Morris County Veterans service officer, to compile cards for Civil War veterans buried at the Evergreen Cemetery.

Like Tom Moore, Janet Armstrong claimed in "Descendants of Nathan Simcock" to be related to Nathan and Charity Simcock, both Friends recorded as buried at the Randolph Friends Cemetery, while one of their children, Jacob, pre-deceased them in 1793 and is recorded in the death records of Rahway and Plainfield Meeting. Nathan Simcock was born in 1726 at Plainfield, then married Charity, in 1756, and they had ten children, of whom six pre-deceased one or both parents. Nathan died in 1808, and Charity passed in 1821.

The late Barbara Hoskins of the Joint Free Public Library of Morristown and Morris Township, also a member of the Association, assisted research by Edna Liddle, Williamsport, Pennsylvania. Whether Nathan Simcock moved from Pennsylvania or moved into Morris County, New Jersey, with similar Friends was unclear from Monthly Meeting records.



In 1796, following removal transfers to western Pennsylvania and Ohio, both Hardwick Friends Meeting and Mendham Friends Meeting incurred lower membership and Rahway-Plainfield Monthly Meeting put both into the new Hardwick and Mendham Monthly Meeting. The preparative and monthly meeting kept its name, even after the northern portion of Mendham Township in 1805 was set apart as Township of Randolph, with three of the five elected township committee being Friends. In 1811, the name of Randolph was adopted for both preparative meeting and Monthly Meeting as a part of Hardwick and Randolph Monthly Meeting.

Loss of members before and during the War of the Southern Rebellion, or Civil War, had caused the Hardwick Meeting to be set down, and then for Randolph Meeting to be set down in 1865. Friends continued to meet after the Civil War with business recorded by Rahway and Plainfield Monthly Meeting.

In 1898, descendants of Friends living in Morris County created their Friends Meeting House and Cemetery Association of Randolph Township to preserve the Meeting House and the Friends Cemetery. The Rahway-Plainfield Monthly Meeting transferred the property by Deed to the Association. Margaret "Peg" Ste-

neck, PhD, long term President of The Association, held the paper records of the Association, and, with her husband, Nicholas Steneck. PhD, created a web page on the internet.

The Friends Meeting House and Cemetery Association became a 501-c-3 tax exempt organization, and it has labored to be seen as owner of the Meeting House and Cemetery with a mandate to preserve both, while the Dover Friends Meeting became a tenant in 1954 with permission to use the Meeting House for its Religious Society of Friends purposes.

Association membership originally was to be limited only to Friends living in Morris County and to descendants of persons interred in the Cemetery. Caretakers and undertakers were allowed to use the cemetery as a "free cemetery" without restriction to the burial of deceased persons or denomination.

Persons having demonstrated strong preservation efforts for the property, such as Richard T. Irwin, was made a member with revision of the By-laws, had serves as Historiographer, had formed the Randolph Township Municipal Landmarks Committee under a local ordinance in 1973, which was authorized later by the State Legislature, and led

the effort for the Meeting House in 1972 and 1973 to be recognized on both the New Jersey Register of Historic Places [1972] and the National Register of Historic Places [1973], was made a member under a preservation category. Ms. Leonora Whildin, a past Mayor of Randolph Township, and the late Wilma Sagurton of Mendham Township, had membership in this category. Following the procedures for descendants, Richard's children, Amanda and Richard, and his wife, Linda, became members in the Association.

In 2004, a bicentennial of the Gradual Emancipation of Slavery that the Legislature enacted on February 15, 1804, was celebrated on a Sunday, noting how Friends - Hartshorn FitzRandolph, Isaac Hance and Joseph Moore - attended the initial meeting at Burlington of the New Jersey State Abolition Society. The 200th anniversary involved a fictional reenactment marking the news brought to the Mendham Meeting House. A news reporter had inquired why others were not marking the bicentennial on the very date, as had the Association. No explanation nor excuse was offered in response.

Another reporter connected The Reverend Eugene Hill with this writer, and Reverend Hill discussed how a black slave from Ten-

nessee had traveled on the Underground Railroad to New Jersey, stopped at the Friends Meeting House, and later served in the 1861 New Jersey militia at the Battle of Bull Run. George Washington Yates was recorded by the late Kemper Chambers as buried at Evergreen Cemetery in an unmarked grave, except for a metal star from the Grand Army of the Republic, the veterans organization that had the Robert Gould Shaw Post 80 formed in Morristown for black Union soldiers.

A notebook with a membership list of the A.T.A. Torbert Post 24, GAR, during the last decade of the 19th century, is a document of the group that survives, except for archives of the John Hill Post 86, GAR, preserved in Boonton, and occasional newspaper reports. The Grand Army of the Republic, the American Legion, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars are veteran service groups that have had an impact.

Seven veterans with Grand Army of the Republic stars and without clear knowledge of any GAR membership were interred in the cemetery. The Religious Society of Friends had long held pacifist views, including Harts-horn FitzRandolph, who objected to military taxes for the French and Indian War and had resigned as tax assessor to protest the tax

in the Revolutionary War. Whigs who thrust Marmaduke Hunt into jail and threatened him and his family to obtain an Oath of Allegiance caused his violation of the principle, and, when called into question, Hunt gave explanation and expressed his wish that the Society "would let it pass by."

Deceased military veterans received family markers which had vital record detail, or Government stones with unit and regimental details, without vital dates recorded, plus "stars" recording names, unit and regimental details. The Veterans Administration continued using Government above ground grave and in ground grave markers [the Hewitt grave has three examples in situ].

David Mitros, now retired as Morris County archivist, noted that Veteran Service Officer was a new position created in 1912 in Morris County, and cards in the Irving Skolnick records were used by Kemper Chambers to compile data for the Civil War soldiers buried at Evergreen Cemetery. Skolnick donated those card records to the Morris County Heritage Commission archives, and are now in storage awaiting a better home and use by researchers.

In 1928, Charles F. Hopkins of Boonton, a

former soldier, prisoner of war at Andersonville, an elected official, and a member of the county Board of Elections, proposed getting 106 "stars" from a New York firm to be placed on the graves of soldiers interred in Morris County. Suggestions were received, veteran service officer Fred Runyan assisted Hopkins, but no record of graves were found. Runyan served as Veterans Service Officer in Morris County, a position created in 1912, as did Irving Skolnick and Charles Jorgensen more recently serve in that capacity.

Jorgensen had little idea about the scope of the database created by Skolnick, changed when the data was affected by a new computer server system, and did not know how the original record card system was donated by Irv Skolnick to the Heritage Commission, but shuffled to a county garage by the County, after David Mitros retired and staff employed by the Commission was reduced, due to the 2008 economic recession.

Further research on families and individuals in Morris County might be aided after 1790 by Federal Census records, after 1864 by State death records in New Jersey archives, and perhaps in local library newspaper digital collections.

Not all soldiers in Northern regiments of infantry or cavalry were interested in joining the Grand Army of the Republic posts and not all of the information about GAR post membership has survived. Stereotypes about Yankee - Rebel prejudice were challenged in the newspapers, which reported on a view in the 1890's that some Southern veterans com-

ing to Newark and Hoboken, New Jersey, were met by Northern veterans, including Black veterans from Morris County, who contributed brass band music.

A photograph circa 1890 from Boonton included one very Black face, dressed in dark blue uniform of the Northern style with nice white gloves, and the name of the veteran was a highly respected Boonton person, for whom space was sought by the Mayor at New Jersey Old Soldiers Home near Newark.

A second family retained the replica GAR uniform and cap with metal numerals of the GAR posts, which helped to explain why older veterans could fit into uniform dress for a photographer or reunion.

The death of Gideon R. "Bob" Hewitt in a Hoboken railroad accident led to the first Civil War veteran interment at Friends Cemetery in 1869. Though the preparative and the monthly meeting after 1865 were "laid down," Friends continued to hold meetings and hold services as descendants, setting the pattern for the Association in 1898, the second oldest preservation group in Morris County, after the Washington Association and the Ford Mansion, preservation by the Federal Government after 1932.



The business of the Friends is recorded in the Monthly Meeting, and from 1758, when the construction of a Mendham Meeting House was approved, a record of burial "at Mendham" would be recorded in Rahway-Plainfield Monthly Meeting minutes. A paper by Richard T. Irwin, "History: The Religious Society of Friends in Randolph Township," in 1973, gave a listing of recorded deaths:

Whether omissions reflect a lack of recording by a Clerk of the Monthly Meeting or a misplaced record was not recovered, it is uncertain.

Additional questions arise. The tradition that Township of Randolph was named for Hartshorn Fitz-Randolph remains a tradition. Residents knew of his service to Friends and to the Mendham community. A Government formed after 1805 had three of five serving township committee members attending Quaker religious meetings. Isaac Hance was the initial township Mayor.

Isaac Hance was married to a daughter of Adam Miller of Boonton, and John Hance was married to a daughter of Adam Miller. Alex D. Fowler wrote his book, Splinters From the Past, owned the house he called the Miller-Kingsland House for decades, but indicated that he did not have information on Quakers. Adam Miller had owned slaves, and Mendham Meeting had followed the beliefs of John

Woolman, who urged the Philadelphia Yearly Meeting that any owned slaves be manumitted. Slave owners had obligations to support persons owned as slaves (which could be Indian and Negro men, women, or children bought at the slave market as imports from Africa and Caribbean islands, or children born to owned slaves, who could be recorded in the manumission records). David Mitros, archivist with the Morris County Heritage Commission, was editor of the Slave Records of Morris County, New Jersey 1756-1841. One record of May 3, 1791, concerned Adam Miller saying that, as his slave boy approached age 21 years, Miller could no longer restrain his "Jack" from freedom through manumission.

William Adams Hance compiled his "William Adams Hance Genealogy." manuscript in 1993. His compilation noted how John Hance (1744-1828?), who married Elizabeth Miller in 1778, and Isaac Hance (1740-1818), who had married Catherine Miller (1750-1810) in 1772. William Adams Hance listed some children of this union: Catherine (married Joseph Moore), Thomas (married Mary Douglas), Adam (married Betsy --), and Charlotte (married Henry Alward).

Alex D. Fowler left Deed records from

Morris County in the Local History Center at the Free Public Library of Morristown and Morris Township archives listing the children of Isaac Hance and Catherine Miller, as Isaac handled the property interests of his wife, who inherited from her father, Adam Miller.

Friends Monthly Meeting child birth records noted the children of Adam Miller and Mary Miller: Conrad Miller (born 2nd day 6th MO 1747), Catherine Miller (born 3rd 11th MO 1749), Ann Miller (born 22nd day 1st MO 1751), John Miller (born 20th day 12th MO 1752), Robert Miller (born 16th day, 10th MO 1754), Elizabeth Miller (born 4th day, 3rd MO 1757), James Miller (born 12th day, 10th MO 1759), and Margaret Miller (born 21st day, 7th MO 1762).

When entering the Randolph Friends Cemetery and crossing to the "Mott section" east of the Annex, the Isaac Hance and Isaac Hance Jr. headstones would not be from the Mayor and his family, but may be from the John Hance family, were John Hance and his wife, Elizabeth, daughter of Adam Miller, to have named a son, Isaac, who had a son, Isaac.

Edward J. Raser mentioned in his New

Jersey Graveyard and Gravestone Inscriptions Locators Morris County how the monumental inscriptions were copied in 1906 by Ginevra Freeman and had a dozen copied inscriptions in the New Jersey History Room at the Morristown library. An Index to Monumental Inscriptions Morris County, compiled in 1982 by Kenn Stryker-Rodda may not be relevant, as no Brotherton and Aber and Blackford family names from Randolph Township were in his index.
